A program to get all Americans online by funding partnerships between states, communities, and stakeholders to build infrastructure where we need it and increase adoption of high-speed internet.



Digital Equity Programs





Three programs that provide funding to promote digital inclusion and advance equity for all. They aim to ensure that all communities can access and use affordable, reliable high-speed internet.

PROGRAMS HIGHLIGHTS

The Digital Equity Act created three programs:

State Planning

 \$60M formula funding program to develop digital equity plans

State Capacity


 \$1.44B formula funding program to implement plans
 & promote digital inclusion

Competitive

 \$1.25B to implement digital equity and inclusion activities

Example eligible uses of funds across three programs include:

- Developing digital equity plans; states and tribes must develop a plan to be eligible for capacity grants
- Implementing digital equity plans and related activities
- Making awards to other entities to help make digital equity plans
- Providing digital literacy and digital skills education
- Improving accessibility and inclusivity of public resources
- Facilitating the adoption of high-speed Internet





Middle Mile Grant Program



Funding pool \$1.00B

A program to expand middle mile infrastructure, to reduce the cost of connecting unserved and underserved areas.


PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Middle mile infrastructure refers to the mid-section of Internet infrastructure that carries large amounts of data at high speeds over long distances and connects the "backbone" of Internet infrastructure to the "last mile", which connects to end users¹

Entities eligible to apply include a wide variety of entities, incl. but not limited to government entities, tribal entities, utilities, companies, and non-profits that provide Internet services

Example uses of funds:

- © Construction, improvement or acquisition of facilities and equipment
- Engineering design, permitting and work related to projects
- Personnel costs, including salaries and benefits
- Other costs necessary to program's activities





Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program





Funding pool \$2.00B

A program to deploy high-speed internet in tribal communities.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) added \$2 billion to the existing TBCP and relaxed time requirements of the original program.

Entities eligible to apply include tribal entities and eligible Alaskan native entities.

A second NOFO will open early next year and include:

- \$1 billion in grant funding
- consultation engagements with leaders
- Application due in mid 2023 (estimated)
